

The Council of the City of North Royalton caucused in the North Royalton City Hall Council Chambers, 14600 State Road on **July 7, 2020, at 7:00 p.m.**

Agenda reviewed.

Mr. Kelly stated with regard to 20-96, the deed transfer on the detention basin, we ask that you please move that to 2nd reading if you don't mind. We are waiting for some confirmation from the School Board.

Mr. Marnecheck stated he would like to take 20-97 into Finance and placed on 2nd reading.

Mr. Marnecheck stated under President of Council's report, we are going to do President of Council Pro-Tem and he will read the recent Ward 3 vacancy and also a statement about the Charter Amendments.

The Council of the City of North Royalton met in the North Royalton City Hall Council Chambers, 14600 State Road on **July 7, 2020 in regular session.** The meeting was called to order at **7:02 p.m.** by President of Council Paul Marnecheck and opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

MAYOR'S REPORT: No report.

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS: Mr. Kelly stated Mr. President and members of City Council tonight you have on the agenda the 4 Charter Review Commission Amendments (20-91, 20-92, 20-93, 20-94) and as you all know, but I would like to state it for the record, according to the Charter Article XVIII, subsection (f), 3rd paragraph, the work of the Charter Review Commission submitted to you this evening "shall submit the same without alteration to the Electors at the next General Election in November." So, as I've told many City Council's before, you may not like it, you may not support it and you don't have to. But you do have to do your duty and send this down to the Board of Elections. He stated he would also like to express to the community as well, and audience that the City Council may or may not support a given Charter Review Commission amendment but it is their duty and they are obliged to send it. This dictates the authority of the Charter Review over the City Council.

PRESIDENT OF COUNCIL'S REPORT: Mr. Marnecheck stated we do have a vacancy when it comes to President of Council Pro-Tem and while he feels himself to be as fit as a fiddle, I would like to have someone in place in case something happens where I am unable to attend.

Mr. Marnecheck motioned to open nominations for President Pro-Tem, seconded by Mr. Dietrich. Mr. Marnecheck stated he would like to nominate Jeremy Dietrich for the position of President of Council Pro-Tem, seconded by Mr. Wos. Mr. Marnecheck motioned to close the nominations for President of Council Pro-Tem, seconded by Mr. Weimer. Roll Call: Yeas: **Six** (Marnecheck, Fenos, Barath, Dietrich, Weimer, Wos). Nays: **None.** **Motion carried.**

Mr. Marnecheck stated we have a vacancy and read the following statement:

The position of Ward 3 Council Representative for the City of North Royalton has been vacated, effective July 5, 2020.

Resumes may be submitted *in person* at the North Royalton City Council Office, 14600 State Road, North Royalton, Ohio 44133 until 4:00 p.m. on Monday, July 27, 2020. Interested applicants must meet the following criteria pursuant to Article III, paragraph (b) of the North Royalton City Charter:

(b) QUALIFICATIONS.

Candidates for Council shall have resided in the Municipality and have been an elector thereof for a period of at least two (2) years next preceding his or her election. Each ward Councilmember must have lived in his or her ward at least one (1) year prior to election and must continue to live in the ward he or she represents during his or her entire term of office. No member of Council, except as hereinafter provided in this Charter, shall hold any other elected public office or be employed by the Municipality, except that of notary public or member of the State Militia, or Reserve Corps of the United States, or be directly or indirectly involved in the disbursement of public moneys of North Royalton, except while performing his or her duties as Councilperson.

To the extent as provided by law, no member of Council shall directly or indirectly solicit, contract for, receive or be interested in the profits or emoluments of any contract, job, work or service with or for the Municipality. Any member who ceases to possess any of the qualifications herein set forth, or who removes from the Municipality, shall thereby forfeit his or her office.

Applicants will be required to sign a document affirming that they meet these qualifications when they submit their resume to the Council Office.

Interviews for this position will be held on Saturday, August 1, 2020 at 2:00 p.m. at North Royalton City Hall, 14600 State Road, North Royalton, Ohio 44133 in a Special Council Work Session. All qualified applicants who have timely filed their resume will be contacted by the City Council Office to attend this interview.

Mr. Marnecheck stated this will also be appearing in the newspaper.

Ms. Schroeder stated in the Post Newspaper starting on the 10th until the 16th and in the Royalton Recorder on the 9th.

Mr. Marnecheck stated the following regarding the Charter Amendments being introduced this evening:

Thank you to everyone for attending tonight's Council Meeting. The Charter Amendments were proposed by a group of residents as required by the North Royalton City Charter. Apart from the Mayor and I thanking the Committee in the first part of the first meeting, no elected official has been engaged with the Charter Review Committee. And that is the way it should be! We are talking about reviewing and possibly changing the City's owner's manual. Tonight, Council is simply being asked to place these proposed changes onto the November ballot so that all of North Royalton, all of us, can vote and make a decision. City Council is simply the vessel to place these on the ballot, which by the way, is that the Charter requires City Council to do! So tonight, we are simply being asked to follow the Charter, and the Law Director can speak to that in more detail. In November, my 1 vote counts the same as everyone else's 1 vote. Us voting tonight to place these on the ballot does not mean we support or oppose the amendments. Council is not making a recommendation for passage of the amendments. We are simply putting the proposals before the Community! This is the same process we used the last time there was a Charter Review Committee while I have been a member of Council. I hope everyone will read the amendments, reflect on them, talk with your neighbors and friends, and think hard before voting this November. this is the purest form of Democracy! To me, this is similar to what we did a few years ago regarding the question of deer hunting. Council chose to place that question before the community and acted accordingly once the community made a decision. And, we will do the same thing here! We are truly placing these questions before the community and asking everyone to be a part of this decision! I am happy to stick around after the meeting, and discuss this in more detail with anyone who is interested.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

All Committees, Boards, and Commissions announced the dates and times of their next regularly scheduled meetings and reviewed items currently on their agendas. All meetings are held at City Hall, 14600 State Road, unless otherwise noted. PUBLIC DISCUSSION**Dawn Carbone-McDonald, 14599 Bennett Road**

Ms. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-92, the initial idea behind the Ordinance is not a bad one. However, it lacks a lot of detail. If you want this Ordinance to be approved by our voters this November, consider adding the following minimum requirements for all Police Chief candidates: Must be a certified Peace Officer in the state of Ohio; must be a current Sergeant level or above and have performed in this position for many years; must have a 4 year college degree in Criminal Justice or equivalent with priority given to candidates with an advanced degree; consider giving priority to residents of the North Royalton; consider using Civil Service tests as one basis to differentiate the best candidate, competition from all applicants; use the test to solely determine what candidates will be interviewed; interview a minimum of 3-5 candidates; candidates for Fire Chief should also have similar established credentials in their field; consider having a 3 person committee consisting of the outgoing Chief, the other Chief and the Safety Director or Mayor in lieu of none; determine the best candidate to present to Council for a final interview and a final vote; the Executive Committee should retain its veto powers if the Mayor is not involved in the process, this also provides the same layer of protection to our Elected Officials.

Ms. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-94, do the right thing, make every attempt to obtain a minimum of 3 quotes. Even if they have to be quickly solicited (inaudible) real estate, have real-estate firms submit percentage of commission, the city will pay per transaction over a defined period; say six months or a year. For the discharge of non-contractual claims against the city, have legal firms submit hourly rates or fixed rates and award them the contract over a defined period, etc. for each possible matter. Don't cut corners. Do the right thing and obtain the minimum required quotes. Our residents deserve this.

Ms. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-97, I stand here as a resident who cares about our communities' best interest. We come to these meetings asking questions, adding thought and input only when needed. My husband and I have spent numerous hours discussing our city jail and finding and presenting a solution that takes our jail costs to a minimum while continuing to provide an adequate amount of police safety to our community. The formula requires a delicate balance between cutting costs and increasing the daily cost of our jail to outsiders whom it utilizes. Ordinance 20-97 increases the price of the jail usage to the level of fair market value that we were so anxious and willing to pay to Parma. \$125.00 a day is far below the \$315.00 a day for Parma. That was such a great deal that we had to call Special Council meetings to attempt to hurry thoughts and approve it so fast. Solon, do you think they're open full-service jail in the County? It hardly has any available space. So, that is something to think about. Yes, the increase, the cost help of that; maybe \$100,000.00 per year. If last year's usage rates remain intact, however this may be far above the fair market value we could receive. Ordinance 20-97 as presented should be amended to add the words "a minimum of \$125.00" to the rate schedule giving flexibility to the Police Chief to negotiate higher jail usage rates, if possible, without Council approval. It should be noted the Chief of Police (inaudible) to perform damage control as several other nearby communities began to be notified of a potential jail closing and our Mayor....

Mr. Marnecheck stated this is not a back and forth, you will be able to speak at the committee meeting on July 21st.

Ms. McDonald stated this disruption will take time for nearby communities to gain our trust again. So, I think that what I said was we need to come together, we need to really, because I know a lot of cities probably don't trust us anymore as far as doing this to our cities; they relied on us. We really need to step back and really work together to make this happen.

Michael McDonald, 14599 Bennett Road

Mr. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-92, I would like to read something; the Civil Service Commission was established to ensure that all employees are selected based on merit and not relationships. This is an important matter. It helps all of our elected officials CYA per say; one of the main benefits of using the guidance provided by the Civil Service Commission it adds that layer of protection for you all. It protects you from potential claims of collusion, corruption, cronyism, etc. I just want to get that on the record. Basically, the way the Ordinance is written, it's a good idea, it needs work. That's what I would say.

Mr. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-94 is kind of more of the same, if you do the right thing and get the quotes and don't cut corners, you're also covering your own --- per say.

Mr. McDonald stated Ordinance 20-97, you guys have been through a lot of stress. You all came together, talked with the Mayor, we appreciate the thought and your input. We are happy the jail is open, but the work needs to be done. The work that needs to be done is not going to be easy. It needs every one's assistance. You all should contact people, neighboring communities and nearby communities, and do some damage control. I know there was damage done when they

were notified that North Royalton was going to close the jail. It's very, very important that you don't short change the damage that may have been caused. It will take time and unfortunately it will take some of our tax payers costs or tax payers money to get this right. But it can be done and you guys are the leadership of the city. Let's make sure that it gets done. Definitely appreciate that.

Lieutenant Keith Tarase, North Royalton Police Department

I'm Lt. Keith Tarase and for nearly a quarter of a century I have served the residents of North Royalton. This, in its entirety, is longer than anyone on Council, and I dare to say, longer than all of your years of service combined. During that time, I've spent 9 years in Patrol, 6 years as a Sergeant, and the past 8 years as a Lieutenant. From day one I have given my heart and soul to this department and community, striving to be the best police officer that I could be and to lift up those around me to be their best as well. I take pride in saying that every day I try to leave this agency better than the day before.

With that being said, I find it sad that this Charter Review Commission believes, and have publicly stated in the proposed ordinance, that the North Royalton Police Department is not professional or modern. I strongly believe the opposite and from my interactions with the community, I know the majority of the North Royalton residents feel the same as I do.

I know this because of the contributions I have been a part of for our police department that have moved us in a positive direction. Whether it was by receiving as much training as possible, ensuring that our officers received proper training, writing or updating policies and procedures, or looking at ways that technology can help us do a better job, it was all done to provide better service to this community. I consider this above and beyond being professional.

Please stop and think of the message that this legislation says to the officers of NRPD and what message does this send to the community? I can tell you what it says to those who have spoken to me and what I think it says. It is as close to a statement of "no confidence" as you can get without saying those words. That we are unprofessional, and no matter how hard you work at your profession and contribute to the safety of this community, our officers will never be capable of serving as Chief of Police because the Mayor and Council gets to decide that someone from outside this Department knows what is best for the safety of the community. What is the advantage of doing your job to the best of your ability and achieving advancements through the ranks if that is the case?

I am highly offended that the Council and Charter Commission call my fellow officers unprofessional and I voice my opinion here tonight to defend my fellow officers. Neither of these groups are qualified to do so! You do not know my fellow officers, how hard they work, their dedication to this community, or what they endure daily, just by wearing the uniform. The nights, weekends, and holidays that they are away from their families so that they can keep you and yours safe.

So, I ask, how does this Charter Amendment make the Police Department more "modern"? What did you find that is not modern about it? We have had many upgrades to the department based on decisions and policies implemented by this group - solid equipment, good vehicles, updated policies and procedures, and have even begun using vehicle and body cameras. All of this being done under the current City Charter.

So how does the proposed Charter Amendment allow for the "highest professional caliber from the largest available pool of qualified candidates..." when the only qualification required is 10 years within the profession? Sure, that creates a larger pool but definitely not a more qualified one. Chiefs that work in the best interest of the department and the officers usually have the best departments! These are the officers that through hard work and determination have achieved this status; not those that are appointed from outside the places they serve. This seems to be more of a political appointment. This proposed Charter Amendment is not only bad for both the Police and Fire Departments, it's bad for the community.

The proposed wording for the ballot is also short, vague and confusing for voters. It seems as if it's being used to trick them into voting for the Amendment change without realizing what their vote actually means. There are just 28 words for voters to consider in completely changing the way that police and fire chiefs are picked in this city. Just 28! Doesn't our community deserve better? More transparency from our elected leaders?

In closing, I would like to state the obvious. Being a police officer is hard enough under normal circumstances, even more so in today's environment. This is reflected in so many ways - specifically I can speak to the number of police applicants that has been dwindling over the years. With no hope of one day becoming Chief, how many less do you think are going to want to apply for OUR test in the fall?

I will also remind the council and the Mayor once again, this Department is full of MY COWORKERS who are professional officers committed to this city and yet the continued actions against the Department will force good officers out of the job for less qualified, political appointments. This and the former Administration has been fond of out-sourcing city services for a number of years. Are the Police and Fire Departments next? For the safety, well-being and overall wellness of the fine residents of this city, I hope not!

If you decide to approve this ordinance, I believe the residents will see through this thinly veiled attempt to usurp the department and jeopardize the safety of our community. I believe they are smart enough to do just that!

Who know our city better? A complete outsider, or one of its own officers and potential residents? I don't even think I need to answer this, but I will. One of our own. And although I may not live here, this is my city, my residents to protect, and my community to be a part of.

Anton Krieger, 12730 Clearbrook Oval

First thing I would like to speak about is the Zoom meetings. I know it's been a difficult transition for City Council and I know some of you are not on the Zoom meetings while you are sitting in the Council meetings. Mr. Krieger stated I just ask that you use transparency that the residents would like when they are engaging on Zoom. Just speak into the microphone, not getting mad to when asked to speak into the microphone, stuff like that.

Mr. Krieger stated the piece of legislation that I wanted to speak about was 20-92. I think the Civil Service Commission is really important, it was implemented long ago to prevent cronyism and I just implore the City Council members to educate all the residents to know how to vote this November. I know it's going to be on the ballot this November, there's really not much you guys can do about it now. I just ask that you guys take a stand so we can prevent cronyism and encourage the Civil Service Commission to continue in the selection of our Fire Chief and Police Chief. Thank you.

Mr. Dietrich stated I know it's been said by our Law Department and I appreciate the officer that came up and spoke on it. The Charter has jurisdiction over this, quite frankly the way it is written, it's been in there for decades I believe, so that's just the way it is. We have to put it on the ballot and it's up to the voters.

Mr. Weimer stated I also wanted to clarify just for members of the public, that you are aware, no member of this body represents a membership on the Charter Review Commission. So, we did not have any say, feedback, ideas that were thrown into that pot. So, I just want to reiterate what the Law Director has already said as well. Just because we are passing these through, does not show support or a vote against any of these amendments. I am more than willing as a Council member, here on this bench, to talk to any of you or any of my residents to where I stand with each of these different amendments. If that's a discussion you would like to have.

Mayor Antoskiewicz stated I might as well just reiterate as well. I just want to let everybody know too, I as well, we wind up selecting 9 residents that submit resumes that review the Charter. I as well, did not have anything to do with the Charter Review Commission. The only thing I did, the first day, I went to the meeting to swear them in and thanked them for their service and for them to do their job as a Charter Review Commission. I want to make that also perfectly clear because I am not sure what some of the perception may be out there. But the Charter Review is an independent, they are 9 residents, very good, upstanding residents, city people that have been here many, many years in a lot of cases. And how those meetings went, and again, I did not attend any of them, I did not Zoom any of them, did not do anything with it. So, I just want to make that perfectly clear.

Ms. Barath stated I want to reiterate that yes; this would not be a vote of mine and I want to encourage everyone in this audience to start your campaigning. If this is something you don't want, you need to get it out to your friends, neighbors and they should go to the polls and tell us this is not what we want.
