2022 marked the 75th Anniversary of the North Royalton Police Department. It was a year of transition for the North Royalton Police Department as it continued to move forward after years of stagnation. Improvements were made to update and modernize an aging facility. 2022 was another challenging year with regards to staffing. A couple of sudden officer retirements left the department short-handed for most of the year. Four full-time officers were hired in 2022 to replace those officers. Despite depleted manpower, the Police Department continued to provide quality service to the residents and businesses of North Royalton. A partnership with the school district allowed the police department to add a part-time School Resource Officer in January. An agreement was reached with the North Royalton School District that will bring a full-time SRO to the elementary school in February 2023. NRPD continued to improve their equipment and technology to provide better service to the community. The Police Department was recognized for their "Excellence in Policy and Training" from Lexipol. Recertification with the Ohio Collaborative was also accomplished. Each officer received extensive training this year. Several agreements were made with local cities to house their prisoners in the jail. These agreements provided guaranteed bed space for a prisoner from those cities and the guaranteed revenue helped offset jail expenses.



North Royalton is a city located in Cuyahoga County Ohio. With a 2023 population of **31,586**, it is the **48th** largest city in Ohio and the **1454th** largest city in the United States.North Royalton is currently growing at a rate of 0.28% annually and its population has increased by 0.84% since the most recent census, which recorded a population of **31,322** in 2020. Spanning over 21 miles, North Royalton has a population density of 1,483 people per square mile.

Administrative Review-Biased Based Policing & Racial Profiling 2022

Review

Continuing to build on 2021's work, a review of patrol operations and complaints for the calendar year 2022 shows that once again, NRPD officers were not subject to any complaint of biased based policing.

All current department personnel continue to complete monthly Daily Training Bulletins (DTB's) related to Biased Based Profiling through the Lexipol system. The policy, issued on April 15th, 2019 has also been issued to, read, and acknowledged receipt of by our three (3) newly appointed officers, also through the Lexipol system.

All Patrol officers, Sergeants, and Traffic Unit officers continue to use their assigned Body Worn and In Car Cameras per Policy 422 and are recording their traffic stops and public interactions with them. Sergeants and OICs are also using the cameras to record interactions with citizens making formal complaints against officers. As noted above, none of the complaints made against officers in 2022 alleged Bias Based Policing.

The Department's Written Warning slips were updated in 2020 to include information related to Biased Based Policing. The CAD entry of the slips was the responsibility of the Clerks, who were given several reminders regarding complete entry. The number of incomplete entries was down significantly in 2022, roughly 20 per month compared to 2021, when there was a significant issue with the incomplete entries.

Synopsis of Data

In calendar year 2022, the North Royalton Police Department issued 1,359 traffic citations, compared to 1,324 citations in 2021, 769 citations in 2020 and 973 citations in 2019. Officers issued 4,196 written warnings in 2022, compared to 3,801 written warnings in 2021, 1,782 written warnings in 2020 and 2,188 in 2019. These numbers show a bounce back from the Covid-19 pandemic. While the number of citations issued increased only slightly, there were approximately 400 more written warnings issued, indicating that the number of traffic stops and citizen interactions increased in 2022 by approximately 450 encounters. Consideration of these numbers must also include that there were two (2) new officers added to the streets during 2022 and that we have a significant portion of the Department (40%) with under 5 years of service, who are more likely to engage in aggressive traffic enforcement. These numbers

show no indication of bias toward any one group, as the percentages fairly well mimic the percentages of each group's representation in the population of the City of North Royalton. See attached 2022 Traffic Stop Break Down (Attached)

RECOMMENDATIONS

Historically, the North Royalton Police Department has been diligent about strict enforcement of motor vehicle and traffic violations, and continues to do so. Officers should continue to carry out this Mission with continued thorough documentation, utilizing the technology and training that has been provided to them. Further recommendations that will allow this Mission to move forward include:

- 1. Continued monitoring of the officers by the Sergeants for any indication of a pattern or practice of Biased-Based Policing and immediate corrective measures such as counseling and/or discipline if warranted.
- 2. Continued use and monitoring of the in-car and mobile camera systems for indications of a pattern or practice of Biased—Based policing, including review of any allegations of improper Policing.
- 3. Continued Bias Awareness training as needed, particularly for the newly appointed officers.
- 4. Continued proper documentation of traffic stops by both the officer, dispatch, and the clerks. Proper review of such documentation by the Sergeant/OIC, and second party checker in the Clerk's Office to reduce the number of unknown parties.
- 5. Continued education of the public, through bulletins, social media posts, and through the North Royalton City Schools to educate the public on what actions we are taking, or to fill the immediate need for information in the event of a serious situation.
- Review of this report by the officers of the Department to see not only where things stand, but where they are headed, as well as to address the results and recommendations.


CONCLUSIONS






USE OF FORCE SUMMARY

In 2022 the North Royalton Police Department had 20 Use of Force Reports. There were 19 arrests. Three offenders were injured (all minor scrapes). One officer was injured (minor bruise). There does not appear to be any trends in the use of force by members. There are no additional training, equipment or policy revisions recommended at this time.









TRAINING SUMMARY

Here are the training highligts from 2022:

32 of the 36 full-time officers completed Crisis Intervention Training (CIT), a 40-hour course put on by the ADAMHS Board of Cuyahoga County. The County paid \$150.00 per day per officer attending the training, resulting in \$24,000.00 being collected by the City for the training. The 3 newer officers and part-time SRO are scheduled to attend CIT in early April 2023. Any new hires after that will attend the training as available.

All 36 full-time and 1 part-time SRO completed 24 hours of state mandated Continuing Professional Training (CPT) in covering topics such as: Legal Updates (4 hours) Use of Force (4 hours) Responding to Mental Health Crisis (4 hours) Diversity-Building Trust and Mutual Respect (4 hours) Domestic Violence (4 hours) and Responding to Sexual Assault (4 hours) The state is again mandating 24 hours of CPT in 2023 for all sworn officers

Between the tail end of 2021 and through 2022, 24 full-time officers who are primarily assigned to patrol attended an 8-hour Advanced Emergency SUV/Night Time Operations course at Tri-C West. There was generally positive feedback regarding this training as many stated that it taught them some new things regarding operating an SUV. The remaining 4 officers and part-time SRO will complete the course in early 2023, as well as any new hires.

At the end of the year approximately 15 officers from the Police Department along with the Fire Department jointly engaged in a Rescue Task Force Drill (RTF) overseen by Southwest Enforcement Bureau (SEB) trainers and the Cuyahoga County Office of Emergency Management (CCOEM) at the new North Royalton Elementary School. In the course of this training, Det. Skoczen and Ptl. Coralic ran their first RTF Drill as Instructors, and will be able to continue supervising these drills going forward.





Vehicle pursuits are reviewed by the immediate supervisor. It was determined that all of the pursuits complied with the pursuit policy.








Deployments By Day Of Week




Deployments By Week



Deployments By Month






Patrol Types




Outcomes For 1 People Found






